

**John Sachse**  
**45th WI Infantry, Company B**

Born: March 3, 1834 in Saxon Weimar, Germany

Immigrated: 1852 with his parents

Married: 1858 to Paulina Rossburg

Enlisted on 10/8/1864 as a Private from Centerville, WI, 30 year-old Shoemaker, 5'3", brown eyes, light hair.

Mustered Out: July 17, 1865 at Nashville, TN

The History of Northern Wisconsin, Vol II. Chicago: Western Historical Pub., 1881, p. 540: "Jno. Sachse, boots and shoes, Hika. Born, March 3, 1834, in Saxon Weimar, Germany. Came to Manitowoc County with his parents in 1852. Worked at this trade four years, then he opened a shop, which he has since carried on. Enlisted in 1864, Company B, 45th Wis. I., and served to the end of the war. Married in 1858, to Paulina Rossburg, of Saxony. Have nine children, four sons and five daughters."

Der Nord Westen, 29 Mar. 1906: "Death in Centerville on Sunday, following a long illness, of John Sachse as the result of a stroke he suffered several months ago. Mr. Sachse, who was 72, came with his parents from Germany in 1852. The family settled in Centerville and the deceased remained there. He operated a shoe shop by himself and was Postmaster for several years as well as filling other elective posts. In the latter stages of the Civil War he served with Co. B of the 45th Infantry Regiment and participated in the battle of Nashville where his regiment did not come under fire but was held in reserve. He is survived by a widow and 7 children. The local post of the G.A.R., of which he was a member, yesterday gave the last salute to its veteran."
